Much has changed in the 55 years since John Fairfield and Kathryn Stoltzfus Fairfield earned their high school diplomas, along with 75 classmates, at EMHS in 1966.

But some core elements remain steady, the couple — now married nearly 52 years — observes. EMS remains true to its Anabaptist roots, they say, and continues to challenge students to wrestle with what it means to be followers of Jesus, committed to peace and nonviolence.

They got to know each other their junior year, working on the Ember yearbook, volunteering with the Young People's Christian Association, and singing in Touring Choir.

John's family moved to the Shenandoah Valley from Ontario, Canada, so his father could pursue studies at Eastern Mennonite


College. Kathryn came from a family involved in Mennonite education for generations. EMS alumni include her parents, Grant and Ruth Brunk '34 Stoltzfus, and siblings: Eugene '64, Allen '61, Ruth '67, and Helen '74.

All four of the couple's sons are alumni, three married alumni, and several grandchildren currently attend, or are alumni.

"I was 'first generation Mennonite," says John. "But I feel just as much part of the EMS story as anyone." His advice to people who may be new to the community and feel they don't belong? "Put time and energy into the community," he says. "Soon you will feel you belong."

Like countless other health care professionals, Dr. Justin Weirich '06 was among those who went the "extra mile" to serve clients during the height of a COVID-19 outbreak last year. A family medicine practitioner at Lutheran Health Physicians in Fort Wayne, Ind., Weirich and his colleagues observed a lack of sufficient COVID testing capacity in local facilities as pandemic numbers swelled in late 2020.

The worst months were late October through mid December," he recalls. "Positive cases were rising exponentially in Michigan, and the clinics in nearby Fort Wayne just couldn't do it all." To keep those patients from overwhelming hospital emergency services, Weirich and colleagues volunteered days off to staff a COVID-specialized clinic.

"It was a challenge," he recalls. "There was a shortage of healthcare professionals as people guarantined and cared for their family needs. But telemedicine has really grown into a valuable tool that continues to be regularly utilized today. This helped us keep up with our regular clients as well as in-person COVID clinic patients."

As a child, Justin watched his father, Gordon Weirich, MD, who has practiced family medicine for more than 40 years in Weyers Cave, Va. "Dad modeled generosity and empathy," Justin remembers. "I always knew I wanted to follow in his footsteps."

Those characteristics have led Dr. Weirich to take part in multiple surgical and medical mission trips to the Philippines, Honduras, and Bolivia, in addition to serving his local community.

Weirich graduated from EMHS in 2006, where he sang in Touring Choir, and played basketball and soccer. The boys varsity soccer team won the Division I state title his senior year, a special memory. "I do call those my golden days!" he notes with a laugh. "But really EMHS was truly a gift for me, and I would never replace those years."

Weirich went on to earn a bachelor's degree in chemistry from the University of Mary Washington and worked preand post-operative care at Rockingham Memorial Hospital in Harrisonburg. He earned his medical degree from the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine in 2016, followed by a residency in family medicine at Fort Wayne Medical Education Program.

Justin is married to Sarah (Beck) Weirich and has two young children.



Faith at Work

"Faith at Work" is this year's theme for chapel (grades 6-12) and weekly elementary gathering. Claire Parsley '22, and Elisabeth Fink '22, shared the following in an introductory chapel. To see chapel videos, search YouTube for "Eastern Mennonite School Chapel."

Claire: "Faith at Work" has been selected for this year's chapel theme. This school has students coming from a wide range of backgrounds and students who have had vastly different life experiences, so "faith at work" in these chapels will likely have different meanings and impacts on each of you.

... I believe [faith] is crucial so that we can motivate ourselves to grow, improve, and put all the gifts we have into our world. It helps us wake up with a purpose and hopefully makes everything seem more possible... everyone

needs a little faith that there's some reason, some purpose to their life. I hope chapel this year.. will get you thinking about what you personally choose to put your faith in.

Elisabeth: ... the word "faith" may almost be misleading. It's definition is only that of a strong belief in God or religion. It's purely abstract and the word itself does not even imply physical action. This year, we want to look at how having faith leads people to do work.

Whether that is physically serving others because you believe it's the right thing to do, or whether it's believing in yourself and making changes in your own life, faith is the core idea guiding these decisions. True faith, though it is technically invisible, is evidenced by visible actions.

"If a brother or sister has nothing to wear and has no food for the day, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace, keep warm, and eat well,' but you do not give

them the necessities of the body, what good is it? So also faith in itself, if it does not have works, is dead." (JAMES 2:15-17)

What this is saying is not that if you don't meet some sort of requirements then your faith "doesn't count," it's just saying that truly, if you believe something, it should change your actions. True faith is always at work.
